HIGHLIGHTS



Relief interventions were conducted across Sudan, and for Sudanese refugees in Chad, Egypt, and Libya, supporting displaced families affected by conflict, famine, flooding, and disease.



83,970 nourished with life-saving food packages and warm meals.



31,860 received core relief items, which restored dignity and shelter to vulnerable households.



8,600 refugees received critical medical care through our Health Tent in Chad.



222 orphans supported through ongoing sponsorship programs.



SUDAN EMERGENCY HUMANITARIAN RELIEF

Total Beneficiaries: **115,652**



FOOD ASSISTANCE

9,142 food packages, warm meals, Ramadan distributions, and Udhayah meat programs reaching 83,970 beneficiaries



CORE RELIEF ITEMS (CRI)

8,172 kits (plastic sheeting, blankets, sleeping mats, kitchen sets, solar lanterns, mosquito nets, hygiene supplies) reaching **31,860 individuals**



HEALTH SERVICES – CHAD (ADRE HEALTH TENT)

8,600 beneficiaries served, 1,100 consultations per month (average)



ORPHAN SPONSORSHIP

222 orphans supported (76 in Sudan, 146 in Libya)



EMERGENCY SHELTER & FLOOD RELIEF

Tents, tarpaulins, blankets, and cooking sets distributed to thousands of displaced households in Darfur and Tawila camps



SITUATION UPDATE

Aid Challenges

Sudan remains one of the world's most severe humanitarian crises. Since April 2023, millions have been displaced by armed conflict, famine-like conditions, disease outbreaks, and economic collapse. Darfur and El Fasher continue to face extreme violence and mass displacement, while neighboring Chad now hosts hundreds of thousands of Sudanese refugees.

Families in overcrowded camps struggle with food insecurity, limited shelter, malaria, cholera outbreaks, and lack of medical care. Flooding in Jabal Marra further devastated homes and livelihoods, compounding urgent needs.
